Our experience

The Young Curators' creative journey alongside Alan Jones has been an enlightening experience of vision and collaboration. Exploring the rich tapestry of Jones's artistic expression, we ventured from viewing the Max Germanos collection at the Macquarie University Art Gallery to the artist's very new studio. Here, we had the unique privilege of witnessing the seamless fusion of Jones's thoughts, emotions and craftsmanship as he shared his masterful works with us. This exciting opportunity has not only granted us insight into the inner workings of the contemporary Australian art scene, but has further inspired us in the curating and integration of Alan Jones's remarkable work in this exhibition.

The ideas and process of Alan Jones

The exhibition *Treasured* offers insight into the rich and diverse practice and artmaking inspiration of Alan Jones. Since his early experience in the art world, on his award of the Brett Whiteley Travelling Scholarship to Paris in 2004, he has been compelled by ideas of originality and the origin of ideas and inspiration. Key to this is *Drawing #12*, 2004, revealing the interpretation of a masterpiece in a simplistic 'little sketch'.

Despite his love of traditional painting – citing it as "the ultimate challenge" – Jones views experimentation as a mutually important endeavour, a facet of his artistic process warmly welcomed for its ability to simultaneously achieve functionality and creativity. He describes his portraits as a "jigsaw puzzle"; the slotting together of thin plywood boards mirroring his lifelong interest in collage. In conversation, Jones stated that his goal was to "... do something different and ... reinvent the wheel and ... explore something new, something I haven't seen before."

Much of the work of Alan Jones is intensely personal and his etchings are a creative faucet portraying nostalgia for his years spent in the Sydney suburb of Cherrybrook. His series of etchings reveal he has "drawn inspiration from places and times where recent history and family history connect." In the height of Covid, Alan Jones's outlook towards subject matter made an unforeseen shift— he began observing the presence of things immediately surrounding him, rather than further and beyond. This shift provoked the creation of his striking and intense still life paintings. This is specifically seen in *Painting 290 (The Treasure Chest)* 2021, which has a touching backstory of how Jones's young son's carefree craftwork stimulated the stunted creativity of his "overthinking" father. Alan Jones teaches us that when one loses sight in their artmaking process, the key to being re-inspired is to embrace the simplicity of their life's natural course; perhaps the most fascinating and divine ideas can only be discovered in the obscure and unexpected moments of the everyday. Throughout his artmaking process, Alan Jones has collaborated with artists and photographers. *Treasured* presents two works created in a collaborative 'swap' with multiple prize-winner artist Nicole Kelly. In this collaboration, each artist has exchanged a painting to be reworked in their own studio spaces. *White Sand Creek* and *Painting 179 – Coogee* reveal a contrast yet cohesion between the two artists' styles as they contributed new ideas and perspectives to each other's works. Collaboration is a key aspect of Jones's practice as it stimulates the development of ideas and material practice.

Alan Jones

Alan Jones is best known for his figurative work and self-portrait paintings. His artistic practice also includes landscape painting, sculpture and printmaking. Jones works across a broad spectrum of mediums and takes a personal approach to the subject matter. His work explores notions of identity, and he has a particular interest in his colonial past. Jones aims to communicate the intricacies of human connections and how his roots subsequently influence his work.

Jones holds degrees from the National Art School Sydney. His awards include the 1997 Pat Corrigan Travelling Art Scholarship, the 2004 Brett Whiteley Travelling Art Scholarship, the 2008 Paddington Art Prize, 2011 Fisher's Ghost Art Award, 2014 Kilgour Prize and the 2015 Mosman Art Prize. He and been a finalist in the Archibald Prize (2016, 2014 and 2013), Wynne Prize (2017) and Sulman Prize (2020, 2019 and 2005) at the Art Gallery of New South Wales. Jones has held numerous solo and group exhibitions nationally and internationally and his work is featured in notable collections. He resides and works in Sydney.

Alan Jones is represented by Olsen Gallery, Sydney.
