Creativity in Wartime commemorates the First World War through the exhibition of creative responses to wartime experiences. The exhibition developed as a result of a state-wide public callout, in 2015, seeking World War One original artworks and artefacts. What resulted was a surprising and diverse collection as generous lenders came forward with their rarely seen personal treasures of historical significance.

The exhibition explores the work of First World War, soldiers and civilians, professionals and amateurs, who made time to draw, write poetry, sing, play instruments, produce trench art, sew quilts, knit socks, put on plays, tell jokes, create cartoons, posters, satirical magazines and tourist items. Some of the artefacts are personal responses by individuals, some are produced at the request of government or media, some are souvenirs for sale while others memorialise and remember.

As author and columnist Peter Fitzsimons AM states -

It is also an opportunity to take those immortal words, "Lest We Forget," seriously, and actually come to know more of the lives of the soldiers and the civilians, on the frontline and at home – including those who used their creative abilities to record and share extraordinary experiences, to entertain, to encourage recruitment, to support the war effort and to express gratitude and sorrow.

These are our people, and this is our story.

Frank Hurley was appointed Australia's second official First World War photographer in 1917. This photograph is one of Hurley's best known composite photographic works, known as *Over the Top*. It depicts Australian soldiers leaving their trenches, combat aircraft flying overhead and bombs exploding. There are several known versions of this image, one was exhibited in London on 1918. It was 6.1 x 4.7 metres and it combined fragments from 12 separate negatives with the sky dense smoke from the bombing.

Norman Lindsay was a painter, draughtsman, illustrator, cartoonist, printmaker, writer and sculptor. He worked for the Sydney 'Bulletin' magazine as a staff artist, and during the war produced official cartoons, pro-conscription posters and book illustrations. Leon Gellert was one of the major soldier-poets of the First World War. He was wounded at Gallipoli and in 1917 published *Songs of a Campaign*. Lindsay's drawing for *Songs of the Campaign* shows damage from a fire in USA in 1939.
