It teaches [children] how to collaborate to achieve a common goal while providing a creative, and even physical and emotional, outlet.' (Julie Hare, 2022). As Professor Pasi Sahlberg notes, 'there is plenty of research showing that music education and engagement in the early years and onwards helps make people more active, more engaged and more creative.'

According to Music Australia, 'Learning music can help students' self-confidence, self-discipline and teamwork. Music helps students progress in other important learning areas such as Maths and English. Indeed, countries with a strong focus on music education tend to have higher scores in literacy and numeracy. Engaging music programs have been shown to help with attendance and can be



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particularly beneficial for students who are not achieving well in school.' (Music Australia)

As it has often been said, 'music touches our souls'; it 'has the ability to transport us to different places and times'. Thursday's festival certainly did this and much more; it made everyone's hearts 'sing'.
