Life beyond the school gates is fast-paced, and the importance of fostering a sense of community, connection and belonging among girls cannot be overstated. Building meaningful relationships, developing a strong sense of identity, and feeling more connected to their school community, provides your daughters with great support during challenging times, and helps them to navigate the complexities of growing and developing in Junior School and adolescence in both the Junior and Senior Schools.

Co-curricular activities in schools play a vital role in achieving the above by providing students with opportunities to engage in diverse interests beyond the classroom. At Abbotsleigh, we are focused on creating these opportunities for learning beyond the curriculum, knowing that there is an important balance to be struck between academic work and co-curricular involvement, both of which have a very important role to play in developing young people.

Our girls are living in a progressive era, where earning a high ATAR score, a bachelor's or master's degree is no longer sufficient on its own. To best prepare them for the future and having greater success in their professional lives, our girls must possess other skills such as interpersonal skills, communication skills, leadership skills, management skills and teamwork.

The staff at Abbotsleigh want to dispel that ambiguity and encourage students to participate in at least one co-curricular activity per term, and we ask for the support of our parents to guide your daughters through this exploration.

Students who engage in co-curricular activities often experience better academic outcomes. Involvement in

co-curricular activities can ignite a student's passion for learning and foster a more positive attitude towards school, resulting in better learning outcomes, educational aspirations and overall academic achievement.

Our girls are so fortunate, and our staff are so generous that we can provide a co-curricular experience for every girl. Whether it be through sport, music, debating and public speaking, performing arts, creative arts, environmental groups, social justice groups, clubs or enrichment activities, our girls are given a place to discover their passions, while building connections within our community.
